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AIC and PCF Sparkletots Preschool strengthen partnership to further intergenerational engagement between seniors and children

The Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) and PCF Sparkletots Preschool (PCFSP) have formally renewed their commitment towards furthering the efforts of intergenerational activities for seniors and preschoolers. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed on 15 January 2025 by AIC's Chief Executive Officer, Mr Dinesh Vasu Dash, and PCFSP's Chief Executive Officer, Mr Victor Bay.

Partnership in intergenerational engagement

2. Under the MOU, AIC and PCFSP will work together to enhance seniors' and children's well-being through intergenerational engagements. This will be done through actively identifying more avenues to nurture innovative intergenerational practices and activities for sustained engagement between the preschools and organisations in the Community Care sector such as nursing homes and Senior Care Centres. More will also be done to educate parents and staff on the benefits of these intergenerational activities and how to support and facilitate them, inside and outside the classroom.
3. Since 2017, AIC and PCFSP have been collaborating to bring intergenerational programmes to the Community Care sector. This has resulted in 198 PCFSP centres being matched to 65 organisations in the Community Care sector. Under the renewed agreement, the initiative aims to achieve a 10 per cent increase in participating PCFSP centres, further strengthening this impactful collaboration.
4. As part of this renewed partnership, AIC and PCFSP are set to embark on several initiatives designed to foster intergenerational engagement, innovation, and learning. Notably, PCFSP recently contributed as a co-author to AIC and Early Childhood Development Agency's *Bridging Generations: Intergenerational Guide for the Community Care and Early Childhood Sectors*. Released in May 2024, this resource emphasises the benefits of intergenerational activities and serves as an educational resource, promoting best practices to enable Community Care staff and teachers to confidently collaborate, plan, and implement these intergenerational activities. The upcoming key initiatives between AIC and PCFSP include:

- Developing a storybook for children that highlights intergenerational themes to build awareness for preschoolers and parents
- Establishing an award to recognise innovative intergenerational ideas from PCFSP teachers and centres, which will be presented at the annual PCFSP Future Ready Fair
- Enhancing training for PCFSP teachers and centres to deepen understanding of the Community Care sector to better support their co-delivery of intergenerational programmes

5. These initiatives exemplify the shared commitment of AIC and PCFSP to create meaningful connections across generations while empowering educators and nurturing a deeper understanding of Community Care.

Commenting on the significance of this partnership, AIC's Chief Executive Officer, Mr Dinesh Vasu Dash, said, "We look forward to the continued partnership with PCFSP in fostering intergenerational activities within our communities. This unique confluence of the oldest and youngest in society provides precious opportunities for both generations to spend time with one another to improve their well-being. For seniors, engaging with young children brings joy and a renewed sense of purpose, which can enhance mental and emotional well-being. These interactions also promote active ageing by keeping socially and physically engaged."

7. Mr Victor Bay, Chief Executive Officer of PCFSP, said, "We are proud to deepen our collaboration with AIC through this partnership. By integrating intergenerational programmes into our curriculum, we provide children with hands-on opportunities to develop care, empathy, and respect for seniors—values that are critical in Singapore's evolving society. These regular shared engagements not only support the character development of our young learners but also encourage meaningful interactions and bonds between generations, whether within families or in the broader community. Our aim is to create lasting intergenerational connections that enrich lives and strengthen the social fabric of our society."

Impact of intergenerational activities

8. The collaboration between AIC and PCFSP continues to promote meaningful intergenerational connections, enriching the lives of children and seniors alike. Through simple games, arts and crafts, and more with the seniors, children learn social and communication skills like patience and respect for others. These experiences support children's emotional and cognitive development, laying a strong foundation of kindness and compassion that informs their interactions with others. Seniors also benefit from renewed energy, social engagement, and emotional fulfilment. Forming genuine friendships with children enables them to rediscover purpose and joy, nurturing a sense of belonging that is both uplifting and rewarding.

9. Ms Margaret Ow is the Centre Principal of PCF Sparkletots Preschool @ Changi-Simei Blk 131, one of the participating preschools in the agreement. She leads the development of intergenerational activities at her centre. “Through the activities, the children learn how to better communicate and interact with the seniors. They are able to apply a matching activity they learnt in preschool to the intergenerational sessions, which supports the improvement of seniors’ hand-eye coordination and refines their motor skills. The seniors, in turn, are delighted to engage with the children. This collaboration is truly meaningful in creating cherished memories and improving the well-being of both children and seniors,” Ms Ow shared.

10. Moral Home for the Aged Sick is one of the organisations in the Community Care sector collaborating with PCFSP on intergenerational programmes with AIC’s support. Ms Jennifer Tang, Moral Home for the Aged Sick’s Operations Director, shared, “This project has made a positive impact on our residents. They always look forward to having the children from PCFSP here to engage them in many interactive and innovative activities.”


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Appendix A: Bridging Generations: Intergenerational Guide for the Community Care and Early Childhood Sectors – Fact Sheet
