Foster carers to receive more support through charitable grants

Foster carers in Victoria will receive much-needed support following an agreement by the Grosvenor Foundation and the Jack Brockhoff Foundation to support Berry Street's foster care work, through a grant of \$150,000 over three years.

Brothers Alan Brockhoff and Jack Brockhoff, partners in the family firm Brockhoff's Biscuits Pty Ltd, were well known for their philanthropy, both establishing philanthropic foundations in their lifetimes. (For more information on the Foundations, see below.)

The Berry Street project being funded by the two Foundations will develop muchneeded systems of peer support and mediation for foster carers who are otherwise struggling to cope.

Berry Street CEO Sandie de Wolf said that the project was vital because of the critical shortage of foster carers.

"Foster care is usually the preferred option when children cannot live safely with their families. However, the number of people prepared to take responsibility for these children continues to decline.

"Unless there are radical changes by 2013 there will be a shortage of over 1,000 place for children in Victoria who have been removed from their families.

"To fix this, the model of foster care needs to be radically improved and the government needs to provide a major increase in the support, training, supervision, financial assistance and respite available to foster and kinship carers.

"Overseas research undertaken by Anita Bell, Berry Street's Statewide Senior Manager of Foster Care, who received the Sir Jack Brockhoff – Churchill Fellowship in 2008, showed that one of the main reasons foster carers in the UK and US were able to get through the tough times was the existence of peer support activities provided by agencies.

"These foster carers are able to access independent mediation when there is conflict between agency staff and the carers, or if a carer wants an independent view on particular agency policy or procedures.

"Foster care agencies in the US and UK have also developed initiatives such as safe web-based forums for carers; on-line bulletins; on-line resource electronic libraries; and activities and support groups for the sons and daughters of carers.

"Each of these initiatives would be adaptable for Australian carers but currently we do not have a similar model of support for foster carers. Berry Street hopes to remedy this, thanks to the support of organisations such as the Grosvenor Foundation and the Jack Brockhoff Foundation.

"We believe that such a system will be a significant first step in encouraging carers to remain in the care system," she said.

Mr Robert Symons, the Chairman of the Jack Brockhoff Foundation said: "The Jack Brockhoff Foundation is delighted to join with the Grosvenor Foundation in supporting the outcomes of foster care research undertaken by Ms Pell. Peer support for foster carers appears to respond to a deeply felt need of foster carers."
