The directors of Equity Trustees Limited, the Responsible Entity of the Coller Funds (the "Funds"), present their report together with the financial statements of the following Funds.

Coller Private Credit Secondaries Fund; for the period 18 November 2024 to 30 June 2025.

The Funds are collectively known as "Coller Funds".

#### **Principal activities**

Coller Private Equity Secondaries Fund was constituted on 7 August 2024, registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission on 4 September 2024 and commenced operations on 3 January 2025.

Coller Private Equity Secondaries Fund is an Australian Feeder Fund, which invests primarily in the Australian dollar denominated share classes of the Coller Secondaries SICAV SA - Coller Private Equity Secondaries, a sub-fund of Coller Secondaries SICAV SA, (the "Underlying Fund"). The Fund seeks to deliver capital appreciation over the long term by investing all or substantially all of its assets through the Underlying Fund in accordance with the Product Disclosure Statement and the provisions of the Fund's Constitution.

Coller Private Credit Secondaries Fund was constituted on 1 November 2024, registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission on 18 November 2024 and commenced operations on 4 March 2025.

Coller Private Credit Secondaries Fund is an Australian Feeder Fund, which invests primarily in the Australian dollar denominated share classes of the Coller Secondaries SICAV SA - Coller Private Credit Secondaries, a sub-fund of Coller Secondaries SICAV SA, (the "Underlying Fund"). The Fund seeks to deliver long term investment returns predominantly through discount capture, contractual interest and capital appreciation by investing all or substantially all of its assets through the Underlying Fund in accordance with the Product Disclosure Statement and the provisions of the Fund's Constitution.

# Notes to the financial statements

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#### 1 General information

These financial statements cover Coller Private Credit Secondaries Fund and Coller Private Equity Secondaries Fund (the "Funds") as individual entities. The Funds are Australian registered managed investment schemes which were constituted on the dates stipulated below and will terminate in accordance with the Funds' Constitutions or by Law.

The Responsible Entity of the Funds are Equity Trustees Limited (ABN 46 004 031 298) (AFSL 240975) (the "Responsible Entity"). The Responsible Entity's registered office is Level 1, 575 Bourke Street, Melbourne, VIC 3000. The financial statements are presented in the Australian currency unless otherwise noted.

The investment activities of the Funds are managed by Coller Capital Limited (the investment manager). The custody and administration services of the Funds are delegated to The Northern Trust Company (the custodian and administrator).

Coller Private Equity Secondaries Fund was constituted on 7 August 2024, registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission on 4 September 2024 and commenced operations on 3 January 2025.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the directors on the date the Directors' declaration was signed. The directors of the Responsible Entity have the power to amend and reissue the financial statements.

## 2 Summary of material accounting policy information

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below.

#### (a) Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the *Corporations Act 2001* in Australia. The Funds are for-profit entities for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of fair value measurement of assets and liabilities, except where otherwise stated.

The statements of financial position are presented on a liquidity basis. Assets and liabilities are presented in decreasing order of liquidity and do not distinguish between current and non-current. All balances are expected to be recovered or settled within 12 months, except for investments in financial assets and financial liabilities and net assets attributable to unit holders.

The Funds manage financial assets at fair value through profit or loss based on the economic circumstances at any given point in time, as well as to meet any liquidity requirements. As such, it is expected that a portion of the portfolio will be realised within 12 months, however, an estimate of that amount cannot be determined as at reporting date.

In the case of net assets attributable to unit holders', the units are redeemable on demand at the unit holder's option. However, holders of these instruments typically retain them for the medium to long term. As such, the amount expected to be settled within 12 months cannot be reliably determined.

#### (a) Basis of preparation (continued)

(i) Compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

The financial statements of the Funds also comply with IFRS as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB).

(ii) New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

AASB 18 was issued in June 2024 and replaces AASB 101 *Presentation of Financial Statements*. The new standard introduces new requirements for the statement of comprehensive income, including:

- · new categories for the classification of income and expenses into operating, investing and financing categories, and
- presentation of subtotals for "operating profit" and "profit before financing and income taxes".

Additional disclosure requirements are introduced for management-defined performance measures and new principles for aggregation and disaggregation of information in the notes and the primary financial statements and the presentation of interest and dividends in the statement of cash flows. The new standard is effective for annual years beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and will apply to the Funds for the financial year ending 30 June 2028.

This new standard is not expected to have an impact on the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, however there will likely be changes in how the statement of comprehensive income and statement of financial position line items are presented as well as some additional disclosures in the notes to the financial statements. Management is in the process of assessing the impact of the new standard.

Certain amendments to accounting standards have been published that are not mandatory for the 30 June 2025 reporting year and have not been early adopted by the Funds. These amendments are not expected to have a material impact on the Funds in the current or future reporting years and on foreseeable future transactions.

# (b) Financial instruments

- (i) Classification
- Financial assets

The Funds classify their financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured at fair value through profit or loss; and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Funds classify their assets based on their business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

The Funds' portfolios of financial assets are managed and their respective performance is evaluated on a fair value basis in accordance with the Funds' documented investment strategies. The Funds' policy is for the Investment Manager to evaluate the information about these financial assets on a fair value basis together with other related financial information.

Underlying Funds are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

For cash and cash equivalents and receivables, these assets are held in order to collect the contractual cash flows. The contractual terms of these assets give rise, on specified dates, to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. Consequently, these are measured at amortised cost.

#### Financial liabilities

For financial liabilities that are not classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, these are classified as financial liabilities at amortised cost (distributions payable, management fees payable, custody fees payable, and other fees payable).

#### (ii) Recognition and derecognition

Each Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes party to the contractual agreement (trade date) and recognises changes in fair value of the financial assets and financial liabilities from this date.

#### (b) Financial instruments (continued)

#### (ii) Recognition and derecognition (continued)

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or the Funds have transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or expires.

# (iii) Measurement

Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss

At initial recognition, the Funds measure a financial asset and a financial liability at its fair value. Transaction costs of financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in the statements of comprehensive income.

Subsequent to initial recognition, all financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value. Gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of 'financial assets or liabilities at fair value through profit or loss' category are presented in the statements of comprehensive income within 'net gains/(losses) on financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss' in the period in which they arise.

For further details on how the fair value of financial instruments is determined please see Note 4 to the financial statements.

#### Financial instruments at amortised cost

For financial assets and financial liabilities at amortised cost, they are initially measured at fair value including directly attributable costs and are subsequently measured using the effective interest rate method less any allowance for expected credit losses (ECL).

Cash and cash equivalents and receivables are carried at amortised cost.

#### (iv) Impairment

At each reporting date, the Funds shall estimate a loss allowance on each of the financial assets carried at amortised cost (cash and cash equivalents and receivables) at an amount equal to the lifetime ECL if the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition. If, at the reporting date, the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Funds shall measure the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month ECL. Significant financial difficulties of the counter party, probability that the counter party will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default in payments are all considered indicators that the asset is credit impaired. If the credit risk increases to the point that it is considered to be credit impaired, interest income will be calculated based on the net carrying amount adjusted for the loss allowance. A significant increase in credit risk is defined by management as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due. Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

The ECL approach is based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Funds expect to receive. The shortfall is then discounted at an approximation to the asset's original effective interest rate.

The amount of impairment loss is recognised in the statements of comprehensive income within other expenses. When a trade receivable for which an impairment allowance had been recognised becomes uncollectible in a subsequent period, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in the statements of comprehensive income.

#### (v) Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the statements of financial position when the Funds have a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts, and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise an asset and settle a liability simultaneously.

As at the end of the reporting period, there are no financial assets or liabilities offset or with the right to offset in the statements of financial position.

#### (c) Net assets attributable to unit holders

The Funds' units are classified as equity if they satisfy the following criteria under AASB 132 Financial Instruments: Presentation:

- the puttable financial instrument entitles the holders to a pro-rata share of net assets in the event of the Funds' liquidation;
- the puttable financial instrument is in the class of instruments that is subordinate to all other classes of instruments and class features
  are identical:
- the puttable financial instrument does not include any contractual obligations to deliver cash or another financial asset, or to exchange
  financial instruments with another entity under potentially unfavourable conditions to the Funds, and is not a contract settled in the Funds'
  own equity instruments; and
- the total expected cash flows attributable to the puttable financial instrument over the life are based substantially on the profit or loss.

As these are multi-class Funds, units are classified as financial liabilities as they do not meet the requirements of equity in accordance with AASB 132 Financial Instruments: Presentation.

Units are redeemable at the unit holders' option; however, applications and redemptions may be suspended by the Responsible Entity if it is in the best interests of the unit holders.

The units can be put back to the Funds at any time, subject to impact of restrictions on redemptions from the underlying funds on the Funds' liquidity as outlined in note 3(d), for cash based on the redemption price, which is equal to a proportionate share of the Funds' net asset value attributable to the unit holders.

The units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at the reporting date if the holder exercises the right to put the units back to the Funds.

#### (d) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statements of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, and other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Payments and receipts relating to the purchase and sale of investment securities are classified as cash flows from operating activities, as trading of these securities represents the Funds' main income generating activity.

#### (e) Income

#### (i) Interest income

Interest income from financial assets at amortised cost is recognised using the effective interest method and includes interest from cash and cash equivalents.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and of allocating the interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts throughout the expected life of the financial instrument, or a shorter period where appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial asset. When calculating the effective interest rate, the Funds estimate cash flows considering all contractual terms of the financial instruments (for example, prepayment options) but do not consider future credit losses. The calculation includes fees paid or received between the parties to the contract that are an integral part of the effective interest rate, including transaction costs and all other premiums or discounts.

#### (ii) Dividends

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date with any related foreign withholding tax recorded as an expense. The Funds currently incur withholding tax imposed by certain countries on investment income. Such income is recorded gross of withholding tax in the statements of comprehensive income.

#### (f) Expenses

All expenses are recognised in the statements of comprehensive income on an accruals basis.

Management fees and costs cover certain ordinary expenses such as Responsible Entity fees, custodian and administration fees, audit fees and other operating expenses.

#### (g) Income tax

Under current legislation, the Funds are not subject to income tax provided they attribute the entirety of their taxable income to their unit holders.

The Funds currently incur withholding taxes imposed by certain countries on investment income and capital gains. Such income or gains are recorded gross of withholding taxes in the statements of comprehensive income. Withholding taxes are included in the statements of comprehensive income as an expense.

#### (h) Distributions

The Funds may distribute their distributable income, in accordance with the Funds' Constitutions, to unit holders by cash or reinvestment. The distributions are recognised in the statements of comprehensive income as finance costs attributable to unit holders.

#### (i) Increase/decrease in net assets attributable to unit holders

Income not distributed is included in net assets attributable to unit holders. As the Funds' units are classified as financial liabilities, movements in net assets attributable to unit holders are recognised in the statements of comprehensive income as finance costs.

## (j) Foreign currency translation

#### (i) Functional and presentation currency

Balances included in the Funds' financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which they operate (the "functional currency"). This is the Australian dollar which reflects the currency of the economy in which the Funds compete for funds and is regulated. The Australian dollar is also the Funds' presentation currency.

#### (ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translations at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statements of comprehensive income.

Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when fair value was determined.

The Funds do not isolate that portion of unrealised gains or losses on financial instruments that are measured at fair value through profit or loss and which is due to changes in foreign exchange rates. Such fluctuations are included in the net gains/(losses) on financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss.

## (k) Receivable for securities sold/payable for securities purchased

Amounts due for securities sold and for securities purchased represent receivables for securities sold and payables for securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet delivered by period end.

Trades are recorded on trade date, and normally settled within eighteen to twenty eight days business days. A provision for impairment of amounts due from the counterparty is established when there is objective evidence that the Fund will not be able to collect all amounts due from the counterparty. Indicators that the amount due from the counterparty is impaired include significant financial difficulties of the counterparty, and the probability that the counterparty will enter into bankruptcy or financial reorganisation and default in payments.

#### (I) Receivables

Receivables may include amounts for interest and dividends. Dividends are accrued when the right to receive payment is established. Where applicable, interest is accrued on a daily basis. Amounts are generally received within 30 days of being recorded as receivables.

# (m) Payables

Payables include liabilities and accrued expenses owed by the Funds which are unpaid as at the end of the reporting period.

A separate distribution payable is recognised in the statement of financial position.

Distributions declared effective 30 June in relation to unit holders who have previously elected to reinvest distributions are recognised as reinvested effective 1 July of the following financial year.

#### (n) Applications and redemptions

Applications received for units in the Funds are recorded net of any entry fees payable prior to the issue of units in the Funds. Redemptions from the Funds are recorded gross of any exit fees payable after the cancellation of units redeemed.

#### (o) Goods and services tax (GST)

The GST incurred on the costs of various services provided to the Funds by third parties such as management, administration and custodian services where applicable, have been passed on to the Funds. The Funds qualify for Reduced Input Tax Credits (RITC) at a rate of at least 55%. Hence, fees for these services and any other expenses have been recognised in the statements of comprehensive income net of the amount of GST recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Amounts payable are inclusive of GST. The net amount of GST recoverable from the ATO is included in receivables in the statements of financial position. Cash flows related to GST are included in the statements of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority, is classified as an operating cash flow.

#### (p) Use of estimates and judgements

The Funds make estimates, assumptions and judgements that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities within the current and next financial year. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

For the majority of the Funds' financial instruments, quoted market prices are readily available.

Models use observable data, to the extent practicable. However, areas such as credit risk (both own and counterparty), volatilities and correlations, require management to make estimates and judgements (refer to Note 4(d) for details). Changes in assumptions about these factors could affect the reported fair value of financial instruments.

The Funds estimate that the resultant ECL derived from using the impairment model, has not materially impacted the Funds. Please see Note 3 for more information on credit risk.

For more information on how fair value is calculated refer to Note 4 to the financial statements.

# (q) Rounding of amounts

The Funds are entities of a kind referred to in ASIC Corporations (Rounding in Financial/Directors' Reports) Instrument 2016/191 relating to the "rounding off" of amounts in the financial statements. Amounts in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars, unless otherwise indicated.

# (r) Comparative period

Coller Private Equity Secondaries Fund was constituted on 7 August 2024, registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission on 4 September 2024 and commenced operations on 3 January 2025. The reporting period covers the period 4 September 2024 to 30 June 2025, hence there is no comparative information.

Coller Private Credit Secondaries Fund was constituted on 1 November 2024, registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission on 18 November 2024 and commenced operations on 4 March 2025. The reporting period covers the period 18 November 2024 to 30 June 2025, hence there is no comparative information.

# 3 Financial risk management

The Funds' activities expose them to a variety of financial risks including market risk (which incorporates price risk, foreign exchange risk and cash flow and fair value interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Funds' overall risk management programme focuses on ensuring compliance with the Funds' Product Disclosure Statements and the investment guidelines of the Funds. It also seeks to maximise the returns derived for the level of risk to which the Funds are exposed and seeks to minimise potential effects on the Funds' financial performance. The Funds' policy allows them to use derivative financial instruments in managing their financial risks.

All investments present a risk of loss of capital. The maximum loss on the Funds' investments in the Underlying Funds is limited to the fair value of those positions. The maximum loss on capital on futures and forward currency contracts is limited to the notional contract values of those positions.

## 3 Financial risk management (continued)

The investments of the Funds, and the associated risks, are managed by a specialist Investment Manager, Coller Capital Limited, under an Investment Management Agreement ("IMA") approved by the Responsible Entity, and containing the investment strategy and guidelines of the Funds, consistent with those stated in the Product Disclosure Statements.

The Funds use different methods to measure different types of risk to which they are exposed. These methods are explained below.

#### (a) Market risk

#### (i) Price risk

The Funds are exposed to price risk on their investment in the Underlying Funds. Price risk arises from investments held by the Funds for which prices in the future are uncertain.

The Funds have a significant concentration of risk arising from their exclusive investments in the Underlying Funds. As at 30 June 2025, the Funds' investment in the Underlying Funds represents 100% of the Funds' financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

The market risk in the Underlying Funds are managed by Coller Capital Limited taking into account the asset allocation of each holding of the Underlying Funds in order to minimise the risk associated with particular countries or sectors while continuing to follow their respective investment objectives, it achieves this primarily through the diversification of investments across investment types, industries and regions.

The table at Note 3(b) summarises the sensitivities of the Funds' assets and liabilities to price risk. The analysis is based on the reasonably possible shift that the investment portfolio in which the Funds invest move by +/- 10%.

#### (ii) Foreign exchange risk

The Coller Private Equity Secondaries Fund invests in the Underlying Fund's Australian dollar denominated Share classes of the Coller Secondaries SICAV SA - Coller Private Equity Secondaries, a sub-fund of Coller Secondaries SICAV SA.

The Coller Private Credit Secondaries Fund invests in the Underlying Fund's Australian dollar denominated Share classes of the Coller Secondaries SICAV SA - Coller Private Credit Secondaries, a sub-fund of Coller Secondaries SICAV SA.

Therefore the Funds are not directly exposed to foreign exchange risk.

#### (iii) Cash flow and fair value interest rate risk

Interest rate risk management is undertaken by maintaining as close to a fully invested position as possible, thus limiting the exposure of the Funds to interest rate risk.

## (b) Summarised sensitivity analysis

The following table summarises the sensitivity of the Funds' operating profit and net assets attributable to unit holders to market risks. The reasonably possible movements in the risk variables have been determined based on management's best estimate, having regard to a number of factors, including the historical correlation of the Funds' investments with the relevant benchmark and market volatility. However, actual movements in the risk variables may be greater or less than anticipated due to a number of factors, including unusually large market movements resulting from changes in the performance of, and/or correlation between, the performances of the economies, markets and securities in which the Funds invest. As a result, historic variations in risk variables should not be used to predict future variances in the risk variables.

#### (c) Credit risk

The Funds don't have a significant concentration of credit risk that arises from an exposure to a single counterparty or group of counterparties having similar characteristics. The main concentration of credit risk, to which the Funds are exposed, arises from cash and cash equivalents and receivable balances. None of these assets are impaired nor past their due date. The maximum exposure to credit risk is the carrying of these balances as at the reporting date.

#### (i) Cash and cash equivalents

The Funds are not materially exposed to credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

The Funds are not materially exposed to credit risk on other financial assets.

#### (iii) Maximum exposure to credit risk

The maximum exposure to credit risk before any credit enhancements at the end of each reporting period is the carrying amount of the financial assets. None of these assets are impaired nor past due but not impaired.

#### (d) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Funds may not be able to generate sufficient cash resources to settle their obligations in full as they fall due or can only do so on terms that are materially disadvantageous.

The Funds are exposed to indirect liquidity risk via their investments in the Underlying Funds. The financial instruments of each Underlying Fund include investments which are not traded on an organised public market and which may be illiquid.

As a result, the Underlying Funds may not be able to liquidate their investments in these instruments at an amount close to their fair value in order to meet liquidity requirements, or to respond to specific events such as deterioration in the credit worthiness of a particular private market investment.

Though the Underlying Funds intend to offer quarterly redemptions, the Underlying Funds offers limited redemption rights. The Underlying Funds impose certain redemption restrictions on all shareholders, including limiting quarterly redemptions of shares to 5% of the net asset value of the Underlying Funds (measured using the NAV as at the end of the immediately preceding month). Any restrictions on redemptions from the Underlying Funds will directly impact the Funds' ability to redeem their shares in the Underlying Funds.

In order to manage the Funds' overall liquidity, the Responsible Entity has the discretion to reject an application for units and to defer or adjust redemption of units if the exercise of such discretion is in the best interests of unit holders. The Funds did not reject or withhold any redemptions during 2025.

# Maturities of non-derivative financial liabilities

The tables below analyse the Funds' non-derivative financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period at reporting date to the contractual maturity date. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows. Units are redeemed on demand at the unit holders' option. However, the Responsible Entity does not envisage that the contractual maturity disclosed in the table below will be representative of the actual cash outflows, as holders of these instruments typically retain them for the medium to long term.

These include the use of recent arm's length market transactions, reference to the current fair value of a substantially similar other instrument, discounted cash flow techniques, option pricing models or any other valuation technique that provides a reliable estimate of prices obtained in actual market transactions.

Investments classified within level 3 have significant unobservable inputs, as they are infrequently traded or not at all. When observable prices are not available for these securities, the Investment Manager uses one or more valuation techniques (e.g. the market approach, the income approach) for which sufficient and reliable data is available. Within level 3, the use of market approach generally consists of using comparable market transactions, while the use of income approach generally consists of the net present value of estimated future cash flows, adjusted as appropriate for liquidity, credit, market and/or other risk factors.

The Funds' investment in the Underlying Funds are recorded at the net asset value per unit as reported by Coller Investment Management (Luxembourg) S.a.r.I, the Alternative Investment Fund Manager of the Underlying Funds.

For further information on valuation processes, please refer to Note 4(d).

# (i) Valuation inputs and relationship to fair value

The unobservable input used in the measurement of the Underlying Funds is the unit price. The higher the unit price, the higher the fair value.

There were no significant inter-relationships between unobservable inputs that materially affect fair values.

## (ii) Valuation processes

A significant portion of the assets of the Funds are held through the Underlying Funds, recorded at the unit price as reported by the underlying investment manager. The Funds may make adjustments to the value based on considerations such as: liquidity of the Underlying Funds, the value date of the net asset value provided, or any restrictions on redemptions and the basis of accounting. No adjustments to the value were made in the current period.

#### Capital risk management

The Funds consider their net assets attributable to unit holders as capital, notwithstanding that net assets attributable to unit holders are classified as a liability. The amount of net assets attributable to unit holders can change significantly on a monthly basis as the Funds are subject to monthly applications and redemptions at the discretion of unit holders.

Monthly applications and redemptions are reviewed relative to the liquidity of the Funds' underlying assets by the Responsible Entity. Under the terms of the Funds' Constitution, the Responsible Entity has the discretion to reject an application for units and to defer or adjust redemption of units if the exercise of such discretion is in the best interests of unit holders.

Net redemptions of shares in the Underlying Funds will be limited per calendar quarter to 5% of the net asset value of the Underlying Funds unless such restriction is waived either partially or in its entirety. Any restriction on the redemption of shares in the Underlying Funds will directly limit the ability of the Funds to redeem the shares held in the Underlying Funds. Where this occurs, it is likely that the Responsible Entity will not accept redemption requests and accordingly will limit the ability of investors to redeem from the Funds.
