Welcome to the City of Light

Step into the mesmerising world of Paris Olympique and be immersed in the three Parisian editions of the Olympic Games – 1900, 1924 and 2024. The Olympic Museum's newest exhibition is a 360° experience entitled "Paris Olympique™: An Immersive Journey", opening in Lausanne, Switzerland on Saturday, 25 May.

Paris Olympique will guide visitors through large-scale projections of "La Ville-Lumière," or "City of Light", past and present. Set to a thrilling musical score against the backdrop of Paris, explore the Olympic sites, the cultural and sports trends, the champions and the transformation of the Games from anonymity to the world's greatest sporting event.

Paris in 360°

Paris Olympique isn't your traditional museum exhibition – it's an audiovisual show featuring minimal text and maximum immersion, accessible for all ages and language speakers.

Located on the museum's first floor, this circular immersive journey, guided by large-scale screens, music and audiovisual content, is organised around four themes.

1. Olympic sites

The three Olympic Games hosted in Paris have had a profound impact on the city's landscape and its inhabitants. This theme explores how the Olympic Games and Paris have contributed to each other's development over the past 124 years.

2. Sports and champions

The Olympic sports programme is not stagnant; it reflects and even anticipates sporting trends in society. This theme spotlights the incredible athletes who have participated in these Games and some of the events, from basque pelota to rope climbing, as well as new sports like breaking (depicted right), in which they have competed.



3. Identity

What have the Olympic Games become over the years? Explore the Games' journey from anonymity to global fame across the three Parisian editions, from 1900 when the Exposition Universelle took centre stage to the spectacular events planned for 2024.

4. Spectacle and culture

The Olympic Games are more than sports competitions – societal, artistic and cultural elements are an integral part of each edition. This theme explores Opening and Closing Ceremonies, artistic competitions, cultural events and the crucial contributions from the world of arts and culture to the Parisian Games.

Try out "extinct" Olympic sports

How would you rate as a competitor in early 20th century sports? The exhibition's two interactive sports areas feature events that won't appear on the Paris 2024 programme – or likely any upcoming edition in the near future.

Visitors can virtually test their capabilities in the "200m obstacle" swimming event from Paris 1900, in which athletes had to climb over a pole, climb over a row of boats, and swim under another row of boats. For Paris 1924, visitors can rise to new heights by trying out rope climbing.

Post-Paris 2024

As the competition heats up, medals are won and champions are born during the Summer Games, the Paris Olympique experience will be updated with the latest content.

Snap a selfie

After finishing the exhibition, head downstairs to the museum's -1 level for a look at the Paris 2024-themed space. Don't miss the photo opportunity with the French Olympic and Paralympic mascots, the Phryges, and pose while holding an official Paris 2024 torch. Be sure to check out the Olympic medal on display as well.





French Olympic and Paralympic uniforms

Gaze up the museum's stairwell to view a cascading display of uniforms produced by French athleticwear brand Le Coq Sportif and designed by Stéphane Ashpool. To learn more about the uniforms' design, you can head to the permanent exhibition on level +1.

Olympic Park

Climb the colourful stairs to Paris 2024! Visitors can choose whether to walk up the museum's exterior staircase, decked out with the look of Paris 2024, or stroll through the Olympic Park to enjoy nine pillars with anecdotes about the three Parisian Games editions and other special décor.



Augmented reality experience


Visitors can step into the Paris of yester-year and experience Olympic augmented reality (AR) experiences at the museum through the official Paris 2024 app on Google Play and the Apple App Store.

Users are transported back in time through an AR portal: they enter the historical Colombes Stadium to be surrounded by the Paris 1924 atmosphere, featuring imagery from the Olympic Museum's archives.



Paris 1900: Women compete for the first time

In 1900, the Olympic Games were largely unknown to the general public. Sport and leisure were reserved for the elites, and the Olympic rings and flag did not yet exist.

Many of the athletes who took part in the "International Contests of Physical Exercise and Sport" that took place in and around Paris during the Exposition Universelle did so unaware that they had actually competed in an Olympic Games, as some of the events were granted official Olympic status quite late in the day.



Some sports on the Paris 1900 programme, such as golf and rugby, have made their return after a long absence. However, events like croquet, jeu de paume and pelota are no longer a part of the Olympic Games, or were not recognised by the IOC as official,

Did you know?

Paris 1900 featured long and high jump competitions on horseback!



including fishing, boule lyonnaise, petanque, kite-flying, pigeon racing, hunting and hurling.

American Alvin KRAENZLEIN won the 60m sprint, the 110m hurdles, the 200m hurdles and the long jump in the space of three days – a feat unparalleled in Olympic history. Raw EWRY (USA), won all three jumping events – the high jump, the long jump and the triple jump – to earn himself the nickname of "Rubber Man".

Women make their mark

Paris 1900 represented a historic watershed in Olympic history in that they saw the inclusion of female athletes for the first time. The first-ever female competitors on the Olympic stage were two Frenchwomen, Madame BROHY and Mademoiselle OHNIER, who took part in the croquet competition.

Charlotte COOPER (GBR, middle picture), who was regarded as the best female tennis player of her generation, defeated France's Hélène PREVOST to win the women's singles final and became the first woman to win an individual Olympic title. The Olympic Games Paris 1924 were widely regarded as a major success. Aside from attracting a large number of reporters and being the first Games to be broadcast over the radio, Paris 1924 also proved to be popular with the public, with a total of 625,000 spectators turning out to watch the events.

These Games introduced the Closing Ceremony ritual as we know it today. This involves the raising of three flags: the flag of the International Olympic Committee, the flag of the current host and the flag of the next host. Finnish runner Paavo NURMI won five gold medals to add to the three he had won in 1920. His most spectacular performance occurred on 10 July. First, he easily won the 1500m and then, a mere 55 minutes later, he returned to the track to win the 5,000m.



American swimmer Johnny WEISSMULLER (above) won three golds. He claimed two further golds at the 1928 Games and went on to become famous playing Tarzan of the Apes in 12 movies. The Paris Games themselves became immortalised in "Chariots of Fire", the Oscar-winning film about principled British runner Eric LIDDELL by Hugh Hudson.



The first Olympic Village

The Olympic Games Paris 1924 ran from 4 May to 27 July, with the heart of the action being Colombes, a suburb in the north west of the city. For the first time, the athletes stayed at an Olympic Village. Built near the Olympic Stadium, the Village comprised portable wooden houses complete with running water, and also featured a post office, bureau de change, hairdressing salon and a restaurant.

At Paris 1924, the Olympic Art Competition reached its peak. Encompassing literature, sculpture, painting, architecture and music and also celebrating sport and Olympism, the competition boasted an illustrious jury that included Jean Giraudoux and Paul Claudel from the literary world, the composers Maurice Ravel and Bela Bartok and the painter Fernand Léger. In 2024, Paris is looking to make its mark on the history of the Games once more with an edition in the very heart of the city, rooted in the concepts of international celebration, inclusion and sustainability, to show that sport can help build a better world.

Paris 2024 chose to include skateboarding, surfing and sport climbing – all of which made their debut at Tokyo 2020 - and add breaking, in its first Games appearance.



This is the first Games emblem to depict a woman's face. It's a nod to Olympic history, as it was at Paris 1900 that women were allowed to compete in the Games for the first time. It's also a reference to equality: these Games will be the first to achieve full gender parity among the 10,500 male and female athletes expected to take part.

Did you know?

The main Olympic Stadium used during Paris 1924, the Stade Yves-du-Manoir, will serve as the field hockey venue for Paris 2024!



Ninety-five percent of the venues are existing or temporary. The Games will be front and centre throughout Paris, from the outdoor Opening Ceremony to events in iconic locations such as the Eiffel Tower, the Seine, Place de la Concorde and the Esplanade des Invalides.





A marathon for all

20,024 runners of all ages and levels will take on the challenge of running the Paris 2024 marathon. The "Mass Participation Marathon" will see participants run the same 42km route through the Paris region as the Olympic athletes. A shorter 10km race, which will be more accessible, including for people with disabilities, is also set to take place in the centre of Paris.


