

## Main Unit Surgery

Title: Standard Precautions in Surgery

Rationale: To ensure a safe hospital environment for patients, visitors, hospital

and medical staff and to minimize the risk of exposure to blood and

body fluids and to prevent the transmission of HIV/HBV.

Policy: Standard Precautions will be utilized by surgery employees and

visitors.

Procedure:

A. Standard Precautions and Personal Protective Equipment

- Blood, body fluids, and other potentially infectious materials should be considered biohazardous. Employee exposures (puncture wounds, mucosal splashes, or contamination of non-intact skin) should be reported immediately to employee health via an Employee Occurrence Report and to the staff person's supervisor.
- Gloves should be worn when contact with blood, body fluids, human tissues, or other potentially infectious materials or contaminated surfaces is possible.
- 3. Fluid proof gowns should be worn if splashing of potentially infectious materials is possible.
- 4. Face shields and protective eye wear must be worn if splashing of potentially infectious materials is possible, which would include during any invasive procedure.
- 5. N95 masks should be worn during any procedure on a known or suspected patient with an airborne communicable disease (i.e. TB, SARS).
- B. Handling and Disposal of Contaminated Sharps, Instruments, Linens, and Related Materials
  - Needles and other sharps will be disposed of in a punctureresistant, leak proof, biohazard labeled container.

- 2. The sharp containers should remain upright throughout use, be replaced routinely, and not be allowed to overfill. Sharp containers will be checked daily by OR staff and replaced when two-thirds full and/or as needed by medical waste removal personnel.
- 3. If needles must be recapped during a surgical procedure, a one handed method is to be used.
- 4. Upon completion of a procedure, contaminated material will be disposed of or removed to the appropriate area for reprocessing. A color coded waste and linen disposal system is used to comply with Universal Precautions:

a. Blue bags: Non-disposable linen

- Red bags: Regulated/contaminated disposable waste
- c. White bags: Non-contaminated waste

5. Contaminated trays will be transported to the soiled utility room using biohazard signage.
