



State of the state: workforce shortage



Michigan needs at least 300 additional dentists, especially in rural communities.



State of the state: workforce shortage



- The demand for registered dental hygienists (RDH) is even higher.
- •Dental assistants (DA) are also in high demand.

State of the state: workforce shortage



We are seeing schedules booking out up to 1.5 years in advance in some rural communities.

There are not quick solutions for this.





- We need rural residents to go into the dental professions. Specifically, dental assistants (DA), hygienists, and dentists.
- If you know people who are job hunting right now and are interested in a medical career there are multiple programs up here which will train DA's onsite. And pay you while you learn!

Emerging challenges



- Fluoridation opposition
- Medicaid uncertainty
- Increasing number of providers dropping HKD or simply unable to take on new patients.
- Increasing number of providers leaving all insurance networks.

What is on the horizon?



- Feasibility study ongoing at Northern Michigan University to establish an RDH program.
 - This would be incredibly helpful for the UP and northern Michigan.
- North Central Michigan College in Petosky is also aiming to start an RDH (Associate) Program.
- Dental Therapy program under development at Ferris State University.
 - Housed in Grand Rapids.
- Kindergarten oral health assessments happening in ALL counties and the City of Detroit.

Finding a dental provider



- Have the beneficiary contact their dental health plan
- If they are still having issues have them contact their Medicaid Health plan



Transportation



 Beginning October 1, 2024 all Medicaid Health Plans are required to provide transportation to dental services.



Adult Dental Medicaid 21 and older



•Effective April 1, 2023 increased reimbursement to 100% of the average commercial rate and increased services to include crowns, root canals and periodontal therapy.

RHC's and dental



- RHC's are currently not able to bill Medicaid for dental services.
- Other states have changed this.
- Challenges and opportunity.
- RHC's CAN do fluoride varnish right now as part of a medical encounter

Varnish MI Program



- MDHHS can provide free fluoride varnish
 - We ask for biannual reporting. It's very minimal.
- Training to all relevant office staff (virtual or in person)
- Varnish can be delegated by the provider to an MA or nursing staff
- Easy intervention

Fluoridation




Water, naturally-



- Michigan has 197 Public Water Systems that are naturally fluoridated at 0.6 ppm or higher-
- Optimally fluoridated water is 0.7 ppm with a range of .6-1.0 ppm
- Our surface water bodies of the Great Lakes have an average fluoride level of 0.3-0.5 ppm


Percent on Community Water System with Access to Optimally Fluoridated Water





