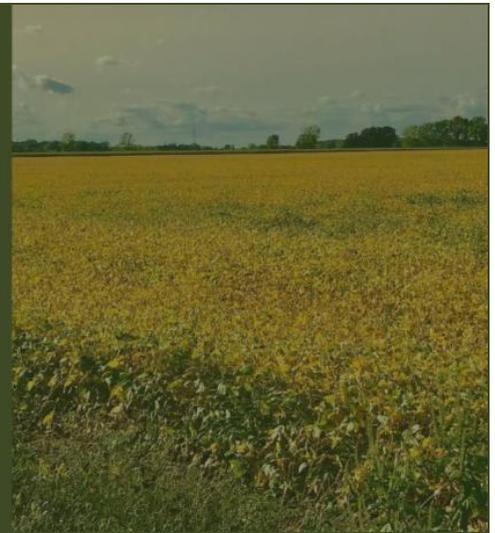

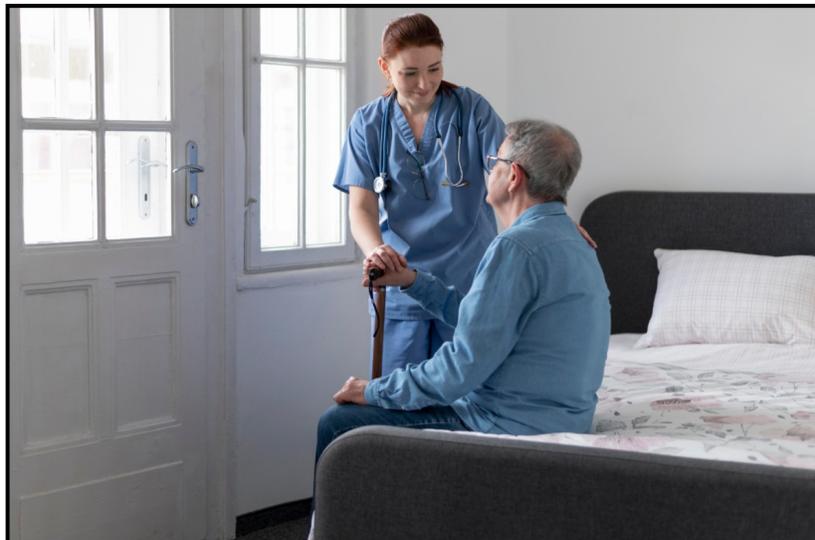

MCRH Announces New Program Focused on Improving Rural Based Palliative Care



MCRH has announced Phase Two of its palliative care programming. Palliative care provides relief from symptoms, pain, and stress associated with serious illnesses

and can be administered alongside curative treatments. It is suitable for patients of any age or illness stage. The program titled "Cultivating Comfort: Enhancing Palliative Care in Rural Michigan," funded by the Michigan Health Endowment Fund, will launch on January 1, 2025, and continue through December 2026.

MCRH has chosen to work with Stratis Health, a longtime partner that has assisted over 40 rural communities with developing and implementing palliative care services. Key partners in this new program will include community organizations from five selected rural areas, chosen through a detailed Request for Applications (RFA) process for this rural-based palliative care initiative. Details on the RFA will be forthcoming shortly after the new year.

Hillsdale Hospital CFO Named to National Rural CFOs to Know List

Hillsdale Hospital's Vice President and CFO, Mark Gross, has earned national recognition on Becker's Hospital Review's **2024 Rural Hospital CFOs to Know list** for the second time, highlighting his leadership in rural healthcare finance.

Gross became the first Hillsdale Hospital CFO to achieve this designation. Becker's states that rural hospital CFOs are vital for financial stability, developing strategies, securing funding, and ensuring affordable care for rural patients.

In his seven years as Hillsdale's CFO, Gross has improved the hospital's finances. Recently, he implemented a strategy that resulted in a net revenue 11 percent above fiscal year 2024 projections. This strategy included expense management, yielding six-figure annual savings moving forward.

Since 2019, the Michigan Opioid Partnership (MOP) has been leading a statewide effort to increase access to Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) - the gold-standard treatment for opioid use disorder - within emergency departments. Through this initiative, the MOP has provided support to over half of the emergency departments across the state, which includes hospitals from all ten prepaid inpatient health plan regions.

In 2024, the MOP held discussions with stakeholders and experts about Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) in emergency departments. The aim was to identify challenges in implementing evidence-based protocols and to propose feasible solutions. Findings and recommendations can be found in a report on the MOP website. In 2025, the MOP will collaborate with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) to implement these solutions and improve access to MOUD.

NEW: State of Primary Care Workforce Report



HRSA's National Center for Health Workforce Analysis collects data, conducts research, and generates information to inform and support public- and private-sector decision making. This brief examines the supply of physicians, physician assistants (PA), and nurse practitioners (NP) practicing in primary care specialties: family medicine, general pediatric medicine, general internal medicine, and geriatric medicine.

While rural areas generally have lower primary care physician ratios than urban areas, the data show that NPs and PAs are essential in providing primary care in rural areas.

Approximately half of PAs were interested in practicing in rural locations (44 percent), Medically Underserved Areas (58 percent), or Health Professional Shortage Areas (54 percent).

The guide "*Strategies for Critical Access Hospitals to Address Outmigration*" assists state Flex Programs and rural hospital leaders in tackling patient outmigration and market share loss. It identifies why patients seek care outside their communities and provides practical strategies for Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) and Rural Health Clinics (RHCs) to keep local patients.

MBQIP Data Submission Deadlines

- Hospital Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (HCAHPS) Q3 2024 encounters (7/1/24- 9/30/24) is due **January 2, 2025**.

- Emergency Department Transfer Communication (EDTC) Q4 2024 encounters (10/1/24- 12/31/24) is due **January 31, 2025**. Connect with your **State Flex Program** for submission process details.
- Reporting **Median time from ED arrival to ED departure**(OP-18) Q3 2024 encounters (7/1/24-9/30/24) is due **February 3, 2025**. Submission is through the HQR Secure Portal-Outpatient. **CART version 1.25.0**. For questions on CART submission and requirement details, connect with your State Flex Program.
- Safe Use of Opioids- Concurrent Prescribing Q3 and Q4 encounters (7/1/24-12/31/24) is due **February 28, 2025**. Submission is through the HQR Secure Portal.

December's Strength of Rural Spotlight: Addiction Treatment Service's (ATS) Mobile Unit Program



Each month, the Michigan Center for Rural Health highlights people and organizations who uplift rural health through the Strength of Rural Spotlight Series. In December, MCRH spotlights Addiction Treatment Services of Traverse City, MI, and its ATS Mobile Unit program.

In Northern Michigan rural communities, access to substance use disorder treatment is often limited or nonexistent. This creates significant challenges for those needing care and turns our region into a "treatment desert." Between 2018 and 2023, the opioid epidemic claimed 13,800 lives in Northern Michigan alone, many of them from rural areas. Additionally, mental health struggles have long been left untreated or under-treated in rural communities, an issue that has been exacerbated by the pandemic, leading to overwhelmed and already stretched healthcare systems.

Meeting these needs and finding assistance can feel like an insurmountable feat.

The journey can often feel overwhelming for individuals and families attempting to navigate these challenges and access the support they need. Addiction Treatment Services (ATS) understood this need and desired to meet people where they are on their path to recovery, so in 2022, it launched its ATS Mobile Unit Program. Starting in just two counties, the program has expanded to six, providing access to much-needed substance use disorder services.

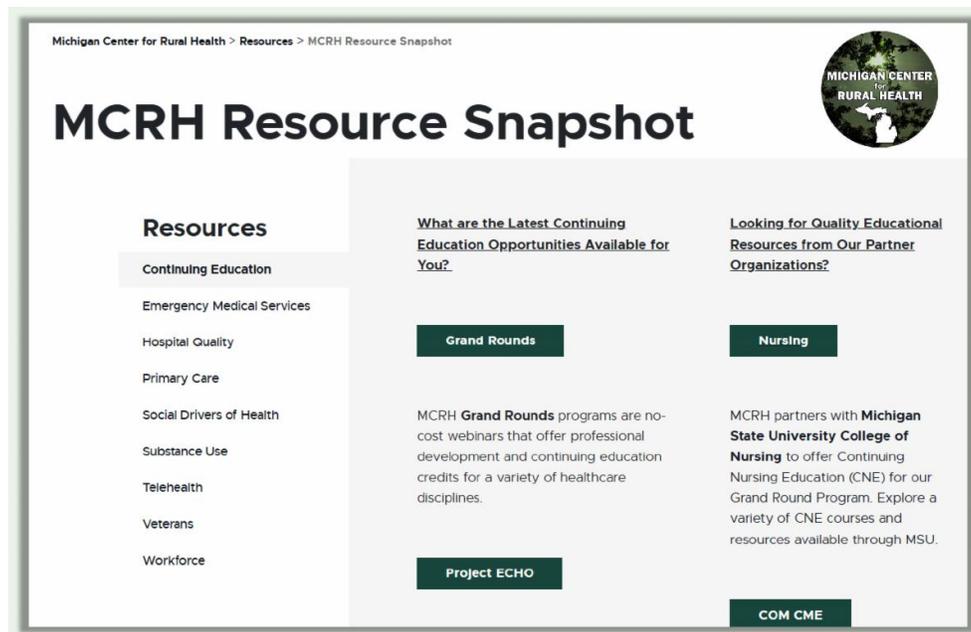
From October 1, 2023, to September 30, 2024, the Mobile Unit Program provided 182 days of service, reaching approximately 339 individuals across six counties—Antrim, Kalkaska, Benzie, Leelanau, Manistee, and Wexford. During this time, it referred 79 individuals to residential, individual, or group therapy, peer support, and OHH/AHH services. On the ATS Mobile Unit itself, it provided 15 individual substance use disorder therapy sessions, 209 primary care supports, 53 peer support sessions, and 169 MAT-related visits (including 151 MAT-related virtual physician visits). These services are crucial for breaking down barriers to care, especially in smaller communities.

Looking ahead to 2025, Addiction Treatment Services is excited to continue expanding its reach and providing ongoing support to rural communities.
