Michigan Releases Application for the Rural Health Transformation Program

The Michigan Department of Health & Human Services (MDHHS) has published the [state's application materials for the Rural Health Transformation Program \(RHTP\)](#). MCRH encourages rural providers to review the released materials and subscribe to the state's listserv to stay informed about future announcements, including any Requests for Proposals (RFPs) related to this funding opportunity. The RHTP is a federally-authorized funding initiative created under H.R. 1 (Public Law 119-21) that sets aside approximately \$50 billion over five fiscal years (FY 2026 through FY 2030) to support rural health care delivery. The program is structured so that states submit a one-time application outlining how they will use funds to transform rural health care ecosystems — focusing on access, sustainability, workforce, innovation, and technology.

Michigan's submission includes a ["Project Narrative"](#) and a [summary document](#) that outline the state's vision for rural health transformation and the proposed use of the RHTP funding. Key highlights of the Michigan application include funding priorities listed as:

- Supporting the development and strengthening of regional partnerships among rural hospitals, clinics, and community organizations to improve

care coordination, align service delivery, expand access points, and promote financially sustainable care models.

- Recruiting and retaining rural health professional, behavioral health providers, and community health workers. Funds will also promote prevention and chronic disease management training and integrated behavioral health care access.
- Implementing technology tools and advancing rural interoperability, including a rural technology catalyst fund to support expanding data exchange, and increasing adoption of telehealth, remote patient monitoring, and technology-driven care coordination tools.
- Establishing digital referral networks that connect residents to local care, prevention, and wellness resources needed to live healthy lives.

It is important to note that the application remains subject to federal review and final award decisions by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

The release of Michigan's RHTP application materials provides an opportunity for rural providers and health systems to align with the state's proposed strategies and prepare for upcoming funding rounds. MCRH encourages rural organizations to use this time to assess their readiness in relation to the program's funding priorities, as the state's plan anticipates forthcoming sub-award opportunities for rural health clinics, hospitals, community-based organizations, and other partners.

The Michigan Center for Rural Health is actively developing a technical assistance plan to support rural providers statewide in preparing strong applications and positioning themselves for success in the next phase of the Rural Health Transformation Program.

This project aims to enhance care for rural adults with uncontrolled hypertension through evidence-based, team-based care strategies in Michigan.

This project, **Enhancing Care for Rural Adults with Uncontrolled Hypertension through Team-Based Care**, builds on a successful PCORI-funded research study. That study compared clinic-based and telehealth-based blood pressure monitoring visits and found both approaches to be effective.

PCORI is supporting the broader implementation of these strategies through new grant funding.


A featured panel discussion showcased how hospitals are advancing population health through community partnerships, data integration, and equity-focused strategies. Panelists shared real-world examples of how collaboration across healthcare, public health, and community organizations can address barriers such as access, workforce shortages, and sustainability.

Key themes of this event emphasized the importance of local engagement, shared resources, and sustainable funding models to strengthen population health across Michigan's rural communities.

The next Network meeting will be held virtually in Winter 2026, focusing on peer sharing and key themes to support continued progress.

New Tool to Identify Pharmacy Shortage Areas Across America



The National Community Pharmacists Association (NCPA), in collaboration with the University of Southern California (USC), today unveiled an interactive, user-friendly pharmacy shortage area mapping tool available to the general public for the first time.

The mapping tool reveals that approximately one in eight U.S. neighborhoods - representing millions of Americans - persistently lack convenient access to pharmacy services. In rural areas and underserved urban communities, the problem is far more severe, with some states and counties experiencing shortage rates approaching 50 percent.

The tool defines pharmacy shortage areas based on travel distance to the nearest pharmacy as defined below:

- More than 10 miles in rural areas
- More than 2 miles in suburban areas
- More than 1 mile in urban areas
- More than half a mile in low-income neighborhoods with low vehicle ownership



Major Gaps in Awareness of Palliative and Hospice Care Among Older Adults



A new national and Michigan-specific poll from the University of Michigan reveals that most older adults know little or nothing about palliative care—yet interest rises sharply once the term is explained. Only 36% of adults ages 50+ nationally, and 33% in Michigan, reported any awareness of palliative care. After learning what it is, nearly 80% of older Michiganders said they would be interested in receiving it if facing a serious illness.

The poll also highlights gaps in awareness of hospice care and identifies significant disparities across racial and ethnic groups. These findings have important implications for rural communities, where access to services can be limited and where clear, early conversations about care options may help patients and families navigate serious illness with greater confidence.

For those working to expand or strengthen rural palliative care efforts in Michigan, the poll reinforces a key message: education matters. When people understand what palliative care is—and what it is not—they are far more open to using it.

MCRH continues to provide monthly Medicare Beneficiary Quality Improvement Project (MBQIP) updates that will help improve the quality of care provided in Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs).

- Updated to remove the SDOH-1 and SDOH-2 measures

- Updated to remove the SDOH-1 and SDOH-2 measures as well as outdated MBQIP 2025 language

Monthly MBQIP Data Submission Deadlines

- Updated monthly with MBQIP data submission deadlines. The SDOH-1 and SDOH-2 measures have been removed from this resource.

MBQIP Measure List (updated 9/1/2025)

- This shows the MBQIP Core Measure Set and Additional Measures. This table was updated to remove the SDOH-1 and SDOH-2 measures per the 8/7/2025 email from FORHP titled "MBQIP Measures Update for SDOH 1 and SDOH 2".
- The table has also been updated to remove language on MBQIP 2025 launch date and MBQIP 2025 rollout. As of September 1, 2025, we will simply be referring to the core measure set as the MBQIP Core Measure Set and no longer MBQIP 2025 due to the official launch of the measures beginning with September 1, 2025.
- Within the table we also updated the categories under the HCAHPS measure. The HCAHPS composite measures and categories were changed within HCAHPS January 1, 2025. These new categories will be reflected in the MBQIP reports next year.
