





1–ISA OLIVO is a senior majoring in comparative cultures and politics at James Madison College, with a double minor in Spanish and LGBT studies. They are an Intercultural Aide and the Racial Justice Educator at MSU's Gender and Sexuality Campus Center, working to create safe, inclusive and educational environments. They are proud to support Diversity, Equity and Inclusion work.

2–CONNOR LE is a senior majoring in history and political science, with a minor in law, justice and public policy. He is the current student body president and president of ASMSU, the undergraduate student government. He advocates for students in many ways, like helping uninsured students receive healthcare and supporting East Lansing as a sanctuary for undocumented immigrants.

3–DANNY CABALLERO is leading an effort to revolutionize how physics is taught at the college level. The associate professor helped create a student-first learning model that is attracting international attention while improving STEM courses for students at MSU.

4–KAILYN BUTLER is a senior in Lyman Briggs College with a double major in neuroscience and human biology and a minor in bioethics. She researches how certain brain cells send messages to control insulin release during early stages of eating. She studies how brain circuits affect blood sugar levels and their potential as targets for treating diabetes and more.

6–GERI ALUMIT ZELDES creates Emmy-winning social justice documentaries, involving MSU students throughout the process so they can develop storytelling and investigative reporting skills. The journalism professor was named among the "100 Most Influential Filipina Women in the World."

7–FLORENE MCGLOTHIAN-TAYLOR has been a veteran of the police force for 30+ years. She works to create an inclusive culture on campus in her role leading the MSU Police Department's Inclusion and Anti-Bias Unit, which proactively addresses police and community-related issues associated with bias.

8–PIOTR PASIK is an instructor in MSU's department of kinesiology, teaching Wheelchair Sports. After obtaining three degrees from MSU, he traveled the world for his studies in the rehabilitation counseling program, exploring other cultures' perceptions of disabilities.

9–CHRISTIAN DURFIELD is a junior with a major in applied engineering sciences. He is involved in the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE). One of his proudest moments as a Spartan was getting his first internship as a first-year student at the NSBE national conference. He aims to inspire the youth in his community by promoting education and equal opportunities, and by encouraging kindness in everyday interactions.

10–NIYA PATEL is a senior studying supply chain management in the Broad College of Business with a minor in information technology. She is also a proud member of the Honors College. An advocate for diversity, equity and inclusion, she hopes to encourage fellow Spartans to get involved, find their passions and develop their leadership skills.






ALYSSA SPACE, '16




It is challenging for many families to pay full educational costs from current income or savings. If you require financial assistance, your first step is to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online as soon as possible after Oct. 1 of the year before you plan to enroll.

HOW TO APPLY

The application for admission will open in August for fall 2026 applicants. MSU strongly encourages students to take a college preparatory curriculum in high school. Students are also advised to apply early.

1. Applications for admission are available at admissions.msu.edu/apply as well as through the Common or Coalition application. MSU has no preference for one type of application over another, but it's important that you submit only one per admissions cycle.

2. Have your official transcripts sent to MSU.

3. ACT/SAT optional: Students will indicate on the application whether they would like SAT or ACT exam scores included in their evaluation. MSU's ACT code is 2032; the SAT code is 1465.
