# Letter from the Erie Canal Bicentennial Commission Co-Chairs and Comissioners


### Introduction

The New York State Canal System is comprised of four distinct canals, spanning more than 500 miles and intersecting more than 200 communities across 21 counties. In partnership with the New York State Canal Corporation and the Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor, the Commission will advance a series of events, forums, and legacy projects that explore the Erie Canal's multifaceted past, while casting an eye toward its future and what form that may take in the hands of the generations to come.

The theme for the Bicentennial, culminating in Fall 2025, is *Raising More Voices*. The Erie Canal represents an unprecedented feat of engineering and ingenuity, connecting the Eastern Seaboard to the Great Lakes and the burgeoning American West beyond. At the same time, we also recognize that the story of the Erie Canal is not monolithic; that by telling the diverse stories that comprise a fuller, more complete account of the Canal's past and present, we can better envision a vibrant and inclusive future. Each of the planned events described in our plan is an opportunity to reflect on the Erie Canal's history and to set a vision for the third Century of operation.

### **Planned Events and Commemorations**

A robust range of programming scheduled through October 26, 2025, New York State's Erie Canal Bicentennial will include inclusive community events and forums across the Canal Corridor. To name just a few, these will include the following:





Major and Corridor-wide Events: e.g., launching the replica of Governor DeWitt Clinton's 1825 canal boat *Seneca Chief* from Buffalo's Canalside in September 2025 to travel to New York Harbor



**Community Events:** e.g., numerous events across upstate NY funded by a NYS Canal Corporation – Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor grant program (2024 –2025)



Arts and Culture: Partnerships with New York State orchestras, featuring diverse, emerging composers, complemented by canalside concerts and educational programming (2024–2025)



Academic Forums: a series of public lectures and panels comprised of State University of New York colleges and universities, the Department of State and New York State leaders to explore how the Canal System can be revitalized as a driver for upstate economic development and environmental stewardship (2024-2025)

World Canals Conference: September 21 – 25, 2025, in Buffalo;

**Legacy Projects:** ribbon cuttings for major community waterfront enhancements and new investments in preservation projects, recreational trails and public amenities (2024 – 2025)



**Bicentennial Promotion Community Toolkit:** promote consistent messaging; social media images and video, fact sheets, banners and giveaways for communities and sites across the 500+ mile canal system, with support from I Love NY (2024 – 2025)



**Economic Development:** The New York Power Authority investments that help to ensure that the Canal remains an economic driver for upstate communities as we enter the third century of operation
