

The California Transparency in Supply Chains Act (SB 657) (the Act), effective January 1, 2012, requires certain companies to report on specific actions taken to eradicate slavery and human trafficking in their supply chain.

As part of the Act, reporting companies must also provide a public statement regarding efforts undertaken to eliminate all forms of slavery and human trafficking.

Sasol respects the rights to life, liberty, security, and the right to be free from slavery, servitude, torture or cruel, inhumane or degrading treatment or punishment. Sasol wishes to make a positive and constructive contribution to the elimination of all forms of forced and compulsory labor and human trafficking. We do not currently engage in the actions described in Section 3(c)(1)-(5) of the California Transparency in Supply Chains Act of 2010. However, we do have the following control measures in place:

1. Sasol Human Rights Policy setting out our commitment to uphold and respect human rights including our expectations on suppliers in our direct supply chain to comply with laws regarding human trafficking and slavery. 2. Employee training that includes the importance of awareness and compliance with its Code of Conduct, including its prohibitions on slavery and human trafficking; and
3. Internal processes and procedures in the implementation of a business and human rights risk-based supplier due diligence assessment, to mitigate potential slavery and human trafficking in the supply chain.
